PARALYSED BY LABOUR CHAOS

LABOUR'S civil war triggered a markets meltdown yesterday - and left the Government 'paralysed'.
Keir Starmer was locked in an extraordinary standoff with his

MPs last night after he brushed aside calls to quit and told rivals Wes Streeting and Angela Rayner to put up or shut up.
Today he is expected to plead with

Mr Streeting and Greater Manchester mayor Andy Burnham to drop their "destabilising" bids to unseat him during separate talks in No.10.
On a dramatic day at Westminster, four Labour ministers resigned, saying they no longer had confidence in Sir Keir. The number of Labour MPs calling for him to go rose to 96, and

Home Secretary Shabana Mahmood was forced to deny she is on the brink of quitting after telling the PM to set out a timetable for his departure.
Deputy Prime Minister David Lammy, meanwhile, appealed to Labour MPs to step back from the

COLOURS

Very contrasted white/black/red, typical right-wing tabloid codes used to dramatise and alarm.

MAIN HEADLINE

“PARALYSED BY LABOUR CHAOS” → directly blames the left-wing party for paralysing the country and implicitly calls for the Prime Minister to resign.

SUBHEADINGS

“anarchy in Downing Street”, “coup”, “madness” → lexical field of disorder and extreme crisis.

INSTITUTIONS

Markets and the monarchy are presented as victims of Labour-induced chaos → pro-establishment view, typical of a right-wing newspaper.

EXTERNAL CONTEXT

The Daily Mail is classified as a right-wing, often pro-Conservative, newspaper.
